On behalf of the American Geophysical Union (AGU) and its community of 130,000 Earth and space scientists, I would like to thank you for your leadership in requesting that the National Academies study racism in STEM studies and careers and in providing funding for the study in H.R.7617. While we have seen some improvements in diversity in the geosciences over the years, a significant gap still exists in the representation of ethnic and cultural minorities in these disciplines.

AGU appreciates your commitment to identifying and addressing barriers to a successful scientific enterprise that is representative of the diversity of our nation. We know that when we have a <u>diverse and inclusive research community and workplace</u>, we will find better solutions to major challenges such as the climate crisis. As we stated in <u>our letter</u> endorsing your STEM Opportunities Act of 2019, garnering the range of perspectives and ideas needed to strengthen science requires a commitment to recognizing and addressing the cultural and institutional barriers, including racism, that prevent many scientists from entering, remaining and advancing in their fields. We are grateful to you and your colleagues for supporting this mission and working to put a spotlight on the deeply rooted racism hindering the STEM community.
